FROM YOUR RECTOR... by the Reverend Sean Ferrell



Here at the beginning of June, our attention likely turns toward plans for the Summer. For many of you, such plans often include a "change of pace," with alterations to your schedule, and travel plans. This change of pace is an essential part of life, giving ourselves a break after the long school year and an opportunity to relax and refresh. By many estimates, Americans vacation less than any other country in the world. It is important to get away.

Unfortunately "Summers off" in a parish setting can become institutionalized. Many Episcopal congregations around the country adjust worship times, number of services, types of music, quality of services, etc. Participation is silently discouraged because the opportunities for involvement are scaled back.

I am reminded of words from the Reverend Bill Tully, Rector of St. Bartholomew's in New York City. When Bill came to St. Bart's in 1994 he was faced with the task of either helping the church to grow or helping to close it. The 1,300-seat sanctuary was attracting only 125 people each Sunday.

The turnaround of St. Bart's over the following years is testimony to Tully's vision and leadership. Out of that experience, Tully has developed principles for growing churches. One of them is the concept of "52 Equal Sundays." He contends that it sends the wrong message when you almost close down for some or all of the summer months. "When people come to your church, you want to be doing your best work always." The goal is 52 equal Sundays.

"Quit messing with the schedule," Tully says. "Provide the same, high-quality worship schedule every Sunday of the year." Tully's goal is to have the kind of "powerful worship every Sunday that will give the greatest opportunity to reach any person who chooses to worship at your church that day." He argues that a summer break can "allow all the vitality of the year to dissipate." Summer visitors unfortunately then get "liturgical leftovers" rather than the vitality of a service that carries on from one week to the next.

"Every Sunday should be a little Resurrection," Tully reminds us, encouraging us to "put out our best offerings – worship, education, hospitality – every Sunday of the year." Therefore, the first Sunday a person attends our church will be the best we can make it. For many people, the experience of the service will be the dominant reason they come back again and again. Every single Sunday must reflect the quality we expect on our "most important" celebrative Sundays.

Friends, I believe we can be proud of Saint Luke's. We have an exciting summer ahead of us, and well be working hard to keep the energy going from this past year. My goal for us is to have the kind of powerful worship every Sunday that will give the greatest opportunity to reach any person who chooses to worship at Saint Luke's this summer.

First, we won't be messing with the service schedule (as so many Episcopal congregations do in the summertime). Services will continue at 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. each Sunday and at 5:15 p.m. each Wednesday evening. You will not have to worry about showing up at the right time.

Second, we'll be providing the same, high-quality worship each Sunday as we do during the rest of the year. Our choir will be singing each week. We will continue to put time and care into planning our worship and liturgy, and I will continue to put the time and energy into preparing sermons that will stick with you. Know this: when you participate this summer and bring others with you, you won't be getting liturgical leftovers; neither will our visitors.

Third, while there are some programs that run only during the academic year, know that we are in no way "taking the Summer off." We have many ways for you to participate and be involved. For our children, we will continue to provide Children's Church each week during our 10:30 service. Along with our friends at First Methodist next door, we will provide Vacation Bible School July 15-19. Adult education will include our weekly Tuesday Bible Study led by the Rev. Dr. Gene Davenport on the Gospel according to Matthew. Our monthly "Holy Grounds Coffee House" will continue on the last Friday of each month during the summer. Our parish has a week of volunteering scheduled at RIFA's community kitchen. Last but not least, our Summer includes our 175th Anniversary celebration on July 22. More information will be forthcoming soon about that event.

The Church experts tell us nowadays that we can expect a third of a congregation to be brand new every three years, and that a third of a congregation will transition elsewhere. They tell us this phenomenon is a part of living in a society where young families are required to move to find employment. And so another sad but important reason to participate this Summer is to say goodbye to three families who making job related transitions out of this community. John, Braun, Jay, Kate Collins, and Ben Campbell will be moving to Jonesboro, Arkansas. Andrew, Mary, Harrison, and Oliver Gallina are headed to Franklin, Tennessee. Lee Ann, Maggie and Lily Robins are moving to the Atlanta metro area in July. We are sad to see each one of them moving on.

Three or four new families moving to Jackson this summer have indicated to me that they will begin worshipping at Saint Luke's. We're excited that they are on their way. As with every other new face, I am counting on you to help me convey why Saint Luke's, the Episcopal Church, and the Christian faith as we have received it is so important to you. I hope that when you are in town between the vacation breaks, you'll take the opportunity to worship with us. You are vital to this community, each and every Sunday!

RIFA COMMUNITY KITCHEN

REMEMBER RIFA WHEN YOU FILL YOUR PANTRY

As a recent volunteer at the RIFA Community Kitchen, I had the opportunity to discuss ongoing needs and issues with their Soup Kitchen Manager, the Rev. Don Daniel. Don is relatively new to the Soup Kitchen and has done a great job preparing meals for the 80 to 120 hungry souls who enter the doors of the lunchroom daily. The demand for the free, hot meal has grown this spring and RIFA could use our assistance to make sure that Don can continue to produce healthy, filling meals for his clients. The week of Easter, Don told me that they did not have enough food to cook the meal for the following Monday, but that donations had always come through, and sure enough, they did. However, it seems senseless that such a vital ministry has to live so hand-to-mouth when a small effort from a group of us could alleviate the problem.

Most simply, they need food - commercial size cans of vegetables, such as green beans or baked beans, and meat, such as hot dogs or chicken breasts. They do have a large freezer, so they can easily accommodate frozen donations, and they welcome large quantities of produce (like when your backyard garden zucchini plants start taking over). Large-size cans are important since they serve so many - you don't want to open 25 cans of lima beans if you don't have to!

Many of us have memberships at warehouse clubs, such as Sam's Club, and the vast majority of us shop at least occasionally at Wal-Mart, both of which carry a variety of commercial-size canned goods (as well as reasonable prices on meat). Please consider purchasing a can or two (which can cost as little as \$3 apiece) when you make your personal trips and know that your donation may have meant the difference between filling every hungry belly and turning people away. And please do consider donating your time to assist Don in his work with the soup kitchen - it is incredibly rewarding for you and truly needed by others.

Give a man a fish and he can eat for a day. Teach a man to fish and he can eat for a lifetime. That is what I saw on the mission trip to Honduras. The El Hogar mission is creating a middle class. Young people who would either die in abject poverty, barely subsist for a shortened lifespan or join a gang and die young are given love, an education and a trade. The children at El Hogar are healthy and happy. Each night we were able to play, color and interact with them. You'd be amazed to see how they can take a large plastic bottle and play soccer with it, or race around the compound on one roller blade, not an electronic toy in sight. You can't imagine how much we take for granted in this country. Imagine having to be careful not to get water in your mouth while taking a shower or not rinsing your toothbrush at the sink because there are parasites in the water. Imagine having to boil water to rinse your dishes or not being able to get any water at all from midnight to 5 AM. That is the reality of Honduras.

The last day we were there the children gave each of us a card they had made, a hug and thanked us for coming. You can't beat that. I hope you will join us next year to see and experience El Hogar for yourself.

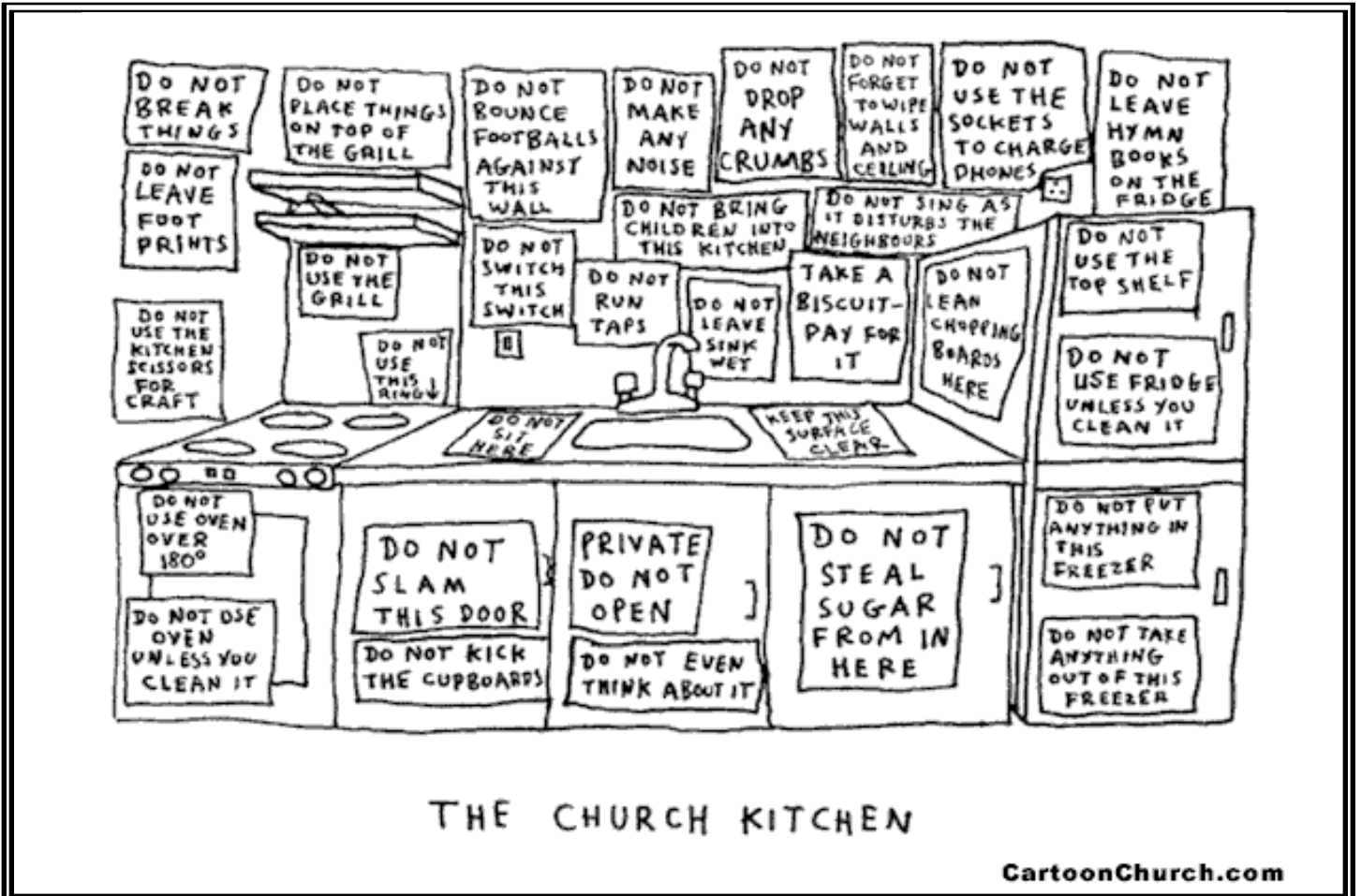
