FROM YOUR RECTOR... by the Reverend Sean Ferrell

Welcome to the *Parish Life* with a brand new look! We're excited about this new layout and we

hope you are too. I want to direct your attention to an article in this month's edition from Senior Warden Greg Kost (page 2). It's an outstanding assessment of our current state and it points to a bright future. Greg shared this at January's Vestry meeting and it is definitely worth your time and attention.

Lent is quickly approaching. Although it seems like we just celebrated the Epiphany (the "feast of lights"), Ash Wednesday kicks off our forty day fast on February 21. In that service we are called to practice the observance of a "holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

My hope is that we at St. Luke's will continue the ancient practice of both *giving things up* and *taking things on* as a part of the Lenten discipline we're called to by the Book of Common Prayer. Some examples of things people give up for Lent include: sweets, meat for all or some meals, caffeine tobacco, or alcohol. Other things that people "give up" include television, or unnecessary work hours. Whatever you pick is a very personal choice.

In most cases, giving up something for Lent is more meaningful if you use the money or time for another purpose. For example, you can use your craving for another purpose. If you give up caffeine, you can use your desire for caffeine as a reminder to pray. Another thought: if you give up meat during Lent, consider giving the money to those in need.

Another opportunity is to consider spending your Wednesday evenings (beginning February 28) participating in our Lenten Program. We're working on a wonderful Lenten program with a catalogue of great speakers. We'll be rolling out the list of speakers in the *Parish Notes*, found in the insert in your weekly service sheet. Please consider participating.

Gail Spruill, in her article about the United Thank Offering, (page 6) shares that we'll be using the United Thank Offering as a parish-wide Lenten Discipline. We hope you will join us in making UTO a personal discipline.

Our Mission Committee is planning a "Living Parable of the Talents" for us. Playing off of the Parable of the Talents from the Gospels, each person is given \$5 and asked to use their talents to make more. What a wonderful Lenten opportunity. There are more details on page 5.

Another great Lenten discipline is to plan to attend church each Sunday, Wednesday, and participate in our special Holy Week services.

Whatever you do, plan to do something. Lent has always taken on the greatest meaning for me when I have taken on a Lenten discipline.

ONE YEAR AGO...

I am pleased to welcome our newest vestry members, Jim Bevis, Donna Boren, Tom DeWitt, John Garrard, Aud Hazlehurst and Gail Spruill. Please know that we appreciate their commitment of time and talents that they bring to the vestry of St. Luke's over the next 3 years.

I would also like to express my deep appreciation to Jimmy Harris who served as our Sr. Warden last year. Jimmy did an outstanding job in guiding us through an interesting transitional year and the end results of his leadership in 2006 will make my job a lot easier as we enter the new year.

When I look at the coming year, I can't help but be excited about what it holds for St. Luke's. Think about how far we've come together as a congregation in the past year. A year ago, in January 2006, I began my term as a new member of the vestry. The memories of the tornado and split in our congregation were still somewhat present, but one could sense a growing excitement and vision of what was on the horizon as we were in the midst of our rebuilding efforts.

One year ago, our nave was a concrete slab, with walls up, and a roof just added. Today, we worship in our beautiful nave, improved and restored to its previous splendor with some welcome additions, including a fabulous narthex.

One year ago, we were faced with borrowing \$500,000 as part of our Capital Funds campaign; but through careful monitoring of our credit line and working with our contractor, we only had to borrow half that amount.

One year ago, we were staring at a budget deficit of \$36,000 for 2006 following a deficit budget the year before. St. Luke's parishioners came through and we finished the year on a strong note, collecting over 98% of our 2006 pledges as well as our non-pledge contributions totaling 120% of our budgeted amount. We ended the year with a deficit budget of \$29,000 which is \$7,000 better than we had budgeted. We've cut our deficit budget for 2007 to \$17,000 which is less than half of last year's figure and the balance of our cash reserves remains a healthy \$80,000. These are phenomenal numbers and we've truly begun to turn the corner as we head into 2007.

One year ago, we didn't realize the coming impact on our ability to reach out to this community. Today, through a generous and humbling bequest to St. Luke's, the "Hal and Beth Meredith Outreach Fund" has been established in the amount of \$1.3 million with income from the endowment to be used for worthy causes in Madison County and West Tennessee for generations to come.

And finally, one year ago, our search committee was just beginning the process of searching for our new rector. The name of the Reverend Sean Ferrell had not yet been brought to our attention. Today, we are blessed to have Fr. Sean as rector of St. Luke's, along with Kiezha and Cian as part of our parish family. Since his arrival in November, our attendance on Sundays has increased dramatically and we had a "full house" for both Christmas Eve services. There is a strong sense of excitement and bonding as a church family as we move into this new year.

God has truly poured out his blessings upon St. Luke's!

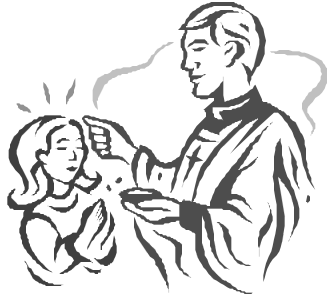
BAPTISM DATE AHEAD...

HALF FULL? HALF EMPTY?

At the Vestry meeting 1/15th, this report was submitted as an update (through 12/31/06) of our Capital Campaign status. In short:

We had a loan balance of \$265,000. (Be mindful that we originally entered into this project thinking this number could be as much as \$500,000.)

This glass is half full!

We had outstanding accounts payable of \$22,000. We had this amount PLUS in the bank to pay these debts entirely.

This glass is half full!

We had working capital (available funds for loan payment after the \$22,000 was paid) of \$30,000.

This glass is half full!

We had outstanding pledges to the Capital Campaign in the amount of \$167,800.

This glass is half full!

In '06, we pulled \$3000 per month from church operating revenues for debt servicing. In '07, we have reduced that monthly accrual to \$1500.

This glass is half full!

The vestry authorized the payment from the \$30,000 working capital to the loan balance leaving an amount owed of \$235,000.

This glass is half full!

The vestry further authorized that ALL monies paid from this point forward from pledges to go directly to debt servicing.

While all of these can only be viewed as positives, we still must contend with monthly interest on the \$235,000 loan balance. That interest payment will cut into the \$1500 per month accrual from our operating budget.

As positive as all these numbers are, we still need two things:

First, we very much need participation from any and all parish-ioners who have not made a pledge to the capital campaign to do so. You can make your commitment through the church financial secretary's office. **PLEASE prayerfully consider becoming involved.** We need your participation!

Second, for those of you who can accelerate your five-year pledge, whether in full or in part, your pre-payment stops interest on our debt the day it is received. We can save thousands by pushing the remaining four years of our commitments into two years. **PLEASE prayerfully consider paying as much of your pledge as possible today.**

MISSION COMMITTEE NEWS

There are three things the Mission Committee wants you to know about...

First, there is still time to join the **mission trip** to El Hogar. El Hogar is a children's school in Honduras that helps educate the underprivileged. Right now there are six of us going, but only two from St. Luke's - Fr. Sean and Susan Francisco. This really is a life changing experience and I urge anyone who is interested to come. The dates are April 14-21, 2007. You will need a passport valid for 6 months after you return. If you cannot come but would like to contribute financially, please contact the parish office. We need to provide \$2000 for the trip. This money goes for supplies for various projects various group work on who come to El Hogar. Prayers are also always welcome.

Second, it's **Coffee Time!** We have joined a fundraising endeavor that utilizes fair trade coffee. This fundraiser benefits St. Luke's missions, the growers, and El Ayudante mission in Central America and Mexico, and gets high quality coffee in your hands at a discount. To order coffee go to www.gustajava.com. At checkout enter the code SLE001 to get the discount. The cost for the coffee is \$11. If you have enjoyed the coffee at coffee hour in the past few weeks, or if you have ordered coffee at *H.R.H. Dumplin's* or *The Baker's Rack*, this is the coffee you will be enjoying. Orders can be picked up at the church on Fridays after the delivery.

Third and finally, the **Lenten Project** of the Mission Committee will be "Living the Parable of the Talents. Using the Parable of the Talents recorded in the Gospels as our model, each person will receive \$5 as starter money and will be asked to use those funds to make more money by using a personal talent or skill. One EYC group shined shoes for people when they were in church and they retrieved them after church. Other parish groups have provided baby sitting services or have sold baked goods, run a car wash, knitted scarves. You get the idea. More details will follow soon. Look for a sign in the Narthex.

REDISCOVERING

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

The United Thank Offering is a ministry of the Episcopal Church and a long standing tradition at St. Luke's that provides a way for men, women and children to give daily thanks to God with a sense of gratitude. It is most easily identifiable by the small blue offering box distributed to members of the parish. Essentially, it is a discipline that begins at home by placing coins or bills in the "Blue Box." The coins or bills placed in the box are designed to be the sum of our daily thanks for the blessing in our everyday lives—for good weather, happy times, job opportunity, and unexpected visits—there are so many things for which we can be thankful. It is the outward and visible sign of the spiritual practice of thanksgiving for all of our many blessings. At the end of the designated period, you are asked to bring the amount of your daily thanksgiving for the ingathering. When the date of the Ingathering approaches, you will receive a blue envelope in the Parish Life. Empty the contents of the box into the envelope and bring it to church on the appointed day or to the church office that week. Continue using your blue box for the next ingathering. The total amount collected will be sent to the Episcopal Church Women, where it is combined with the offerings of hundreds of thousands of other Episcopalians to become the United Thank Offering.

This year, St. Luke's has decided to use the United Thank Offering during the season of Lent. It is our hope that you will make it a part or your own personal Lenten discipline. At the beginning of Lent (on Ash Wednesday, February 21 and on the first Sunday of Lent, February 25) the blue boxes will be available in the Narthex and in the Commons for anyone wishing to participate (adults and children alike!) Our Spring Ingathering will occur on Palm Sunday, Sunday, April 1, and you will receive your blue envelope in the April edition of the Parish Life which will be mailed out on March 26.

The first United Thank Offering was in 1889. It began as part of Missionary efforts of the Women's Auxiliary to the Board of Mission, authorized by General Convention in 1871. Julia Chester Emery, secretary to the Women's Auxiliary, and Ida Soule, who counted the missionary offering of the 1886 Triennial meeting of Women, inspired women to pray and give coins with the idea of building a new church in Anvik, Alaska as well as sending Miss Lisa Lowell as a missionary to Japan.

Way back in that first year, the offering reached \$2,188.64. The total offering these days ranges between two and a half and three million dollars all of which is used for projects at home and abroad. In 2005, UTO awarded close to \$2.7 million in grants. Since the early years UTO has become a worldwide effort to meet compelling human needs and to expand the mission and ministry of the church—for men, women and children throughout the world. The great and wonderful news is that every cent collected is used to support grants for mission and ministry, as the program itself is run by Episcopal Church Women volunteers from each diocese of the Episcopal Church.

Please do join us in this marvelous opportunity!

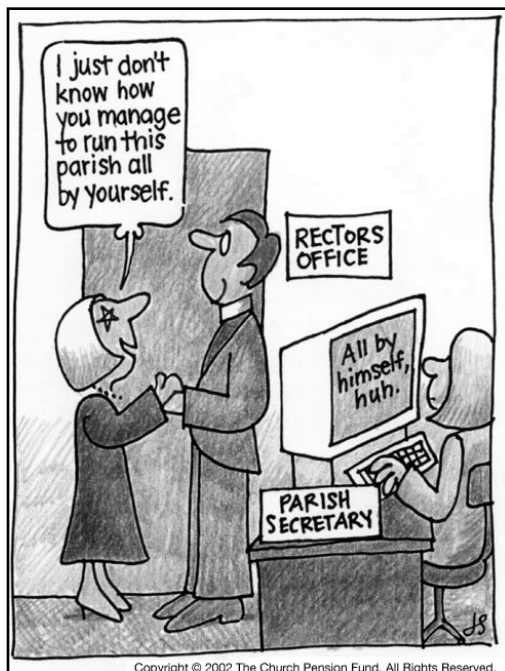

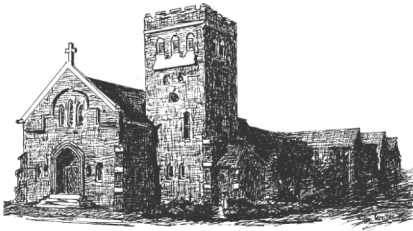
