Since the week of September 10, St. Luke's has offered prayer opportunities at the church 6 days a week. Of course, we have our normal opportunities for worship on Sunday, but we've added Morning and Evening Prayer Monday-Friday. We gather at 8:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. in the chapel, a newly designated space that we originally set up during the year that St. Luke's hosted the annual diocesan convention. (It's upstairs above the nursery.) On Tuesday, we also have the Bible Study on the Gospel of John following prayer (9 a.m.).

These opportunities for prayer vary in attendance. Sometimes there's just one person there, other times 5 or 10 show up. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus says "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." Even when just one person shows up, we are not alone because the church is always in prayer somewhere. We realize that the two current time slots may not work for everyone, but we hope by starting this practice, we will be able to root our church in prayer that will bear more fruit as we abide in Christ's love. Dancing with Tradition and Technology -- The Rev. Timothy True

On August 28 I bit the bullet and bought a new car. It's an EV (Electric Vehicle), a 2023 Hyundai Ioniq 5, and thus far it's paying for itself: my former gas and oil expenses are about the same as my new monthly payment. It's exciting to drive, quiet and technologically on the cutting edge, kind of like driving inside a computer, evocative of the first time I rode the then brand-new Disneyland rollercoaster *Space Mountain*. Still, the learning curve is high and sometimes challenging. For instance, more than one person has cut in front of me at a public DC fast charger (as I was moving



my car into the charging station slot!), leaving me with the unpleasant choice of confronting a fellow human being about their inconsiderate behavior or sucking it up and adding thirty minutes or more to my wait time. Ugh! Anyway, with navigating the lagging infrastructure, not to mention still figuring out how the car works, well, it's been a bit of a wild ride, *mostly* enjoyable, over the past couple months—not unlike church life.

Which, speaking of church, on the one hand, things around here are starting to feel settled for me. The staff has now been restructured; I sense a strong team spirit—good people through and through. My Letter of Agreement has been revised: apparently you and I, along with the bishop, want to continue our work together through 10/31/2025, at least. And the fall program is rolling along like an EV, smooth and quiet.

However, on the other hand, we've encountered a few recent congregational bumps in the road toward revitalization, growing pains. All I ask is that we continue doing what we already are: demonstrating patience and flexibility as we journey toward greater stability together.

Even so, the scenery is beautiful. This is the landscape I now see:

Facilities Manager. Kevin Eberle, our part-time bookkeeper for the past several months, has expanded his position to full-time and now includes overseeing our facilities. You will find more information elsewhere in this newsletter.

- **Pledge Drive**. A list of households has been compiled and letters have been sent out via US mail: our pledge drive is under way. The timeline for the drive is through November with Ingathering Sunday planned for Thanksgiving Sunday, Nov. 26.
- **Conference and Convention**. I will attend a one-day clergy conference in Memphis on Saturday, Nov. 4; and the Diocesan Convention at St. John's Episcopal Church in Memphis on Friday, Nov. 17. This year's delegation includes delegates Berta Garrity, John Hughey, and Tony Jordan; and alternates Michele Jackson and Renee Jordan.
- **Feast of All Saints with Holy Baptism.** This Principal Feast will be celebrated on All Saints Day, Wednesday, November 1, at 6pm. It will include the baptism of Molly Ivy, incense, a chanted Eucharist, and special music by the St. Luke's Choir. Join us for this festive occasion. Nursery will be available. A reception will follow in the Commons, graciously provided by the Ivy family. The regular Wednesday evening program will not take place.
- **Lessons and Carols.** Mark your calendars too for Sunday, December 3 at 4pm for a service our Book of Occasional Services calls "Advent Festival of Lessons and Music." Scripture passages will be read by members of the greater Jackson community with special music from the St. Luke's Choir. And so you know, this event will kick off a choral Evensong agenda, musical prayer services to take place at 4pm on the last Sunday of each month beginning in January 2024.
- **Christmas is coming**. Heads up. Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday this year, meaning that the morning service will still be in the Advent season and afternoon and evening services will fall in the Christmas season. Let that settle for a moment. And . . . yeah, the nave will need to be redecorated between the morning and evening services, etc., etc. So, Merry Frenetic Christmas! But yes, you heard right: *the* morning service, as in only one. Service times on Christmas Eve (Sunday, Dec. 24) will be 9am (Rite II), 4pm, and 10:30pm. Look for details in the weeks to come.

And since I mentioned my car, is anyone interested in being a part of an ad hoc committee to explore the possibility of bringing **EV chargers** to our church parking lot? Two words: residual income. But also: reducing carbon emissions. Anyway, if so, let me know.
